We give you thanks, O God, for in the beginning your Spirit moved over the waters and by your Word you created the world, calling forth life, in which you took delight.





#### Sermon

## Tú has venido a la orilla You Have Come Down to the Lakeshore v. 1, 3-4

The hymn Tú has venido a la orilla (You Have Come Down to the Lakeshore) is often known by its original Spanish title, "Pescador de Hombres" (Fisher of People). It was written by Monseñor Cesáreo Gabaráin, a Roman Catholic priest and one of the most prolific composers of Spanish liturgical music after the reforms of the Second Vatican Council in 1962-65. Gabaráin wrote the original text and music in Madrid in 1979. The hymn's theme follows parallel passages in the synoptic Gospels (Matthew 4: 18-20, Luke 5: 1-11, and today's Gospel, Mark 1: 14-20). The hymn invites the singer/hearer to follow Christ with the same obedience and commitment as the first disciples who answered Jesus' call at the Sea of Galilee.


