From the Pastor

The season of Lent begins on Ash Wednesday with the call to repent — to go in a new direction and return to God. The first reading for Ash Wednesday usually comes from the prophet Joel, but there is an alternate reading from Isaiah that I found particularly striking this year. I share it here and invite your reflection on this text as a guide to your prayer and devotions during Lent.

Shrove Tuesday, Ash Wednesday, and the Season of Lent

The season of Lent, (from a word for "spring"), a 40-day liturgical season of reflection and repentance, begins with Ash Wednesday on February 17th. Typically, St. Andrew would gather on Shrove Tuesday (or "Mardi Gras") the day before, to share in pancake dinner and fun time with the community before a worship service. Worship on Ash Wednesday would begin our Lenten observance with Imposition of Ashes and Holy Communion. This year, due to the pandemic, St. Andrew's observance of these special times in the church calendar will look quite different. There will be a recorded worship service for Shrove Tuesday that includes the burying of the "Alleluias" and burning of palms from last Palm Sunday. This service will be posted to the congregation's Facebook and YouTube pages, along with our website, for you to engage with at your convenience. For Ash Wednesday, a prerecorded Family Service will be available on Facebook, YouTube, and St. Andrew's website. We will also offer a Zoom gathering for worship, similar to how we have been worshiping on Sundays, at 7:00 p.m. Login information is:

Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) Future Church Design Affirmed by ELCA Church Council

The Church Council of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), St. Andrew's denomination, affirmed the church's proposed Future Church design, which focuses on "a renewed purpose to activate the entire church so that more people may know the way of Jesus and discover community, justice, and love."

In response to continuing trends in membership and diversity and the data from an innovation readiness survey, the following new criteria were affirmed for the ELCA:

- 1. Prioritize the engagement of new, young and diverse people.
- 2. Unite all expressions of the church (congregations, synods and the churchwide organization) into one church—together.
- 3. Align decision-making, accountability and leadership where best suited.
- 4. Operate in agile, flexible and speedy ways.
- 5. Act based on data and measurable impact.
- 6. Eliminate silos and divisions.

In that spirit, ReconcilingWorks is encouraging all partner Reconciling in Christ congregations to expand and update their public commitments by 2025:

- 1. Your community explicitly states a welcome to people of "all sexual orientations, gender identities, and gender expressions" or "LGBTQIA+" and names its commitment to racial equity or antiracism in its welcome statement.

Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service (LIRS) Sets Policy/Advocacy Priorities for 2021

Since its inception in 1939, Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service (LIRS) has offered welcome to over 500,000 refugees to the United States. The organization has "supported, equipped, and empowered these new Americans, while advocating for policy that protects all of God's children." LIRS has faced many challenges in the past several years, as circumstance and public policy have limited their capacity to effectively serve their constituents. As a new Congress and Executive Administration begin work, LIRS has set an agenda of advocacy priorities. For those in the congregation who are interested in supporting the work of LIRS, these emphases are:

- 1) Prioritize the reunification of all separated families and strengthen protections for unaccompanied children.
- 2) Restore U.S. leadership in refugee resettlement.
- 3) Ensure COVID-19 relief, testing, and treatment regardless of immigration status.
- 4) Reinstate asylum, suspend deportations, and institute Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) and Customs and Border Patrol (CPB) reforms.
- 5) Invest in and implement community-based alternatives to detention.
- 6) Provide Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) and Temporary Protected Status (TPS) recipients a path to citizenship.
- 7) Reduce the citizenship backlog.
- 8) Advance immigrant workforce and education opportunities.
- 9) Provide a pathway to citizenship for the 11 million undocumented people in the U.S.
- 10) Act on climate displacement.

The new president has released a plan to reform the country's immigration system, which addresses some of these concerns, but as we well know, in our government system there can be a vast divide between hopes and what actually becomes enacted as law. There will be plenty of opportunities for advocacy in the upcoming months.
