Introudction to This Week's Featured Hymn

Thanksgiving for Baptism

People of the congregation are invited to gather near a source of water, or to bring a receptacle filled with water along with them to worship, as we remember and give thanks for God's gift of Holy Baptism.

P: God who sent the Light into our world, who shone in the Bethlehem manger, whose Spirit spreads the Light to all nations, be with you all. **C: And also with you.**

P: Let us give thanks for the gift of Baptism.

As we gather at the font, O God, creator of oceans and rivers, rain and snow, we thank you for the water you provide us each day.

We praise your Spirit, hovering over the waters.

We bless you for this cleansing water of rebirth, this flood of endless mercy, this fount of blessing and hope.

At the river your Son was baptized by John and anointed with the Holy Spirit. By water and your Word you claim us as your children, making us heirs of your promise and servants of all.

We praise you for the gift of water that sustains life, and above all we praise you for the gift of new life in Jesus Christ. Shower us with your Spirit, and renew our lives with your forgiveness, grace, and love.

To you be given honor and praise, through Jesus Christ our Lord, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, now and forever. **C: Amen.**

Gathering Hymn

Thy Holy Wings

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The hymn "Thy Holy Wings" comes partially from a Swedish folk tune entitled "Bred Dina Vida Vingar," which translates to "Spread Your Wide Wings." Karolina Sandell, who wrote the text, was from Fröderyd, Sweden and was the daughter of a Lutheran pastor. "Thy Holy Wings" refers to biblical images found in Psalm 51: 10, Psalm 91: 4, Psalm 119: 14, and Luke 13: 34. The text was first published in 1866 in "Korsblomman" (Cross Flower), as "Children's Evening Prayer." The connection of the text with the "Bred Dina Vida Vingar" tune goes back to 1889, when they were published together in a hymnal entitled "Sionstoner" (Melodies of Zion). Portions of our current version of "Thy Holy Wings" were translated by Gracia Grindal, Professor Emeritus at Luther Seminary in St. Paul, MN. The text and tune of "Thy Holy Wings" evoke tenderness, comfort and strength, drawing on Luke's portrayal of Jesus as a mother hen who gathers her chicks under the protection of her wings.

Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are, the Holy One of God." ²⁵But Jesus rebuked him, saying, "Be silent, and come out of him!" ²⁶And the unclean spirit, convulsing him and crying with a loud voice, came out of him. ²⁷They were all amazed, and they kept on asking one another, "What is this? 
