+ Transfiguration of our Lord Order for Worship

The Sundays after Epiphany began with Jesus' baptism and end with three disciples' vision of his transfiguration. In Mark's story of Jesus' baptism, apparently only Jesus sees the Spirit descending and hears the words from heaven. But now Jesus' three closest friends hear the same words naming him God's Beloved. The light of God's glory in Jesus has enlightened us through Holy Baptism and shines through us for others to see.

Thanksgiving for Baptism

People of the congregation are invited to gather near a source of water, or to bring a receptacle filled with water along with them to worship, as we remember and give thanks for God's gift of Holy Baptism.

P: God who sent the Light into our world, who shone in the Bethlehem manger, whose Spirit spreads the Light to all nations, be with you all. **C:** And also with you.

P: Let us give thanks for the gift of Baptism.

As we gather at the font, O God, creator of oceans and rivers, rain and snow, we thank you for the water you provide us each day.

We praise your Spirit, hovering over the waters.

We bless you for this cleansing water of rebirth, this flood of endless mercy, this fount of blessing and hope.

We give you thanks, O God, for in the beginning your Spirit moved over the waters and by your Word you created the world, calling forth life, in which you took delight.

Through the waters of the flood you delivered Noah and his family. Through the sea you led your people Israel from slavery into freedom. At the river your Son was baptized by John and anointed with the Holy Spirit. By water and your Word you claim us as your children, making us heirs of your promise and servants of all.

We praise you for the gift of water that sustains life, and above all we praise you for the gift of new life in Jesus Christ. Shower us with your Spirit, and renew our lives with your forgiveness, grace, and love.

To you be given honor and praise, through Jesus Christ our Lord, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, now and forever. **C: Amen.**

P: Let us pray.

O God, in the transfiguration of your Son you confirmed the mysteries of the faith by the witness of Moses and Elijah, and in the voice from the cloud you foreshadowed our adoption as your children. Give us the vision to see beyond the turmoil of our world and to behold your glory revealed in Jesus; through him, your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

Reading – 2 Kings 2: 1-12

¹Now when the LORD was about to take Elijah up to heaven by a whirlwind, Elijah and Elisha were on their way from Gilgal. ²Elijah said to Elisha, "Stay here; for the LORD has sent me as far as Bethel." But Elisha said, "As the LORD lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So they went down to Bethel. ³The company of prophets who were in Bethel came out to Elisha, and said to him, "Do you know that today the LORD will take your master away from you?" And he said, "Yes, I know; keep silent."

⁴Elijah said to him, "Elisha, stay here; for the LORD has sent me to Jericho." But he said, "As the LORD lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So they came to Jericho. ⁵The company of prophets who were at Jericho drew near to Elisha, and said to him, "Do you know that today the LORD will take your master away from you?" And he answered, "Yes, I know; be silent."

⁶Then Elijah said to him, "Stay here; for the LORD has sent me to the Jordan." But he said, "As the LORD lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So the two of them went on. ⁷Fifty men of the company of prophets also went, and stood at some distance from them, as they both were standing by the Jordan. ⁸Then Elijah took his mantle and rolled it up, and struck the water; the water was parted to the one side and to the other, until the two of them crossed on dry ground.

⁹When they had crossed, Elijah said to Elisha, "Tell me what I may do for you, before I am taken from you." Elisha said, "Please let me inherit a double share of your spirit." ¹⁰He responded, "You have asked a hard thing; yet, if you see me as I am being taken from you, it will be granted you; if not, it will not." ¹¹As they continued walking and talking, a chariot of fire and horses of fire separated the two of them, and Elijah ascended in a whirlwind into heaven. ¹²Elisha kept watching and crying out, "Father, father! The chariots of Israel and its horsemen!" But when he could no longer see him, he grasped his own clothes and tore them in two pieces.

And he was transfigured before them, ³and his clothes became dazzling white, such as no one on earth could bleach them. ⁴And there appeared to them Elijah with Moses, who were talking with Jesus. ⁵Then Peter said to Jesus, "Rabbi, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah." ⁶He did not know what to say, for they were terrified. ⁷Then a cloud overshadowed them, and from the cloud there came a voice, "This is my Son, the Beloved; listen to him!" ⁸Suddenly when they looked around, they saw no one with them any more, but only Jesus.

⁹As they were coming down the mountain, he ordered them to tell no one about what they had seen, until after the Son of Humanity had risen from the dead.



Alleluia, Song of Gladness

Portions of "Alleluia, Song of Gladness" may be some of the oldest hymn material the Christian church still sings. The earliest form of its text, "Alleluia, Dulce Carmen," is found in three Latin manuscripts from the British Isles in the 11th century. The music for the version in the "Evangelical Lutheran Worship" hymnal was composed by John Goss, organist of St. Paul Cathedral in London in 1868. The tune is named LAUDA ANIMA (Praise, My Soul), Latin for

the first words of Psalm 103. The hymn was first translated into English by John Mason Neale, a resident of London who was ordained in the Church of England, likely in 1851. "Alleluia, Song of Gladness" is traditionally sung on the last Sunday before Lent (or Shrove Tuesday), so that the church can celebrate with "Alleluia"s one last time before the penitential season begins.




