Parker Kantos' Ordination—Sunday, July 11th

Hello, Friends of St. Andrew Lutheran Church,

With great joy and celebration, I am pleased to announce that I have been called to be the next pastor at Brighton Heights Lutheran Church. My ordination and installation are set for July 11th at 2:30 p.m. I am extremely excited for this next phase of my ministry.

If you were to Google Brighton Heights Lutheran Church, you might notice that, while it is a Lutheran church, it is a member of the North American Lutheran Church (NALC) rather than the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). Ultimately, I made the decision to leave the ELCA and join the NALC. I made this decision for a couple of reasons. Primarily, I wanted a denomination that supported and believed in my call to the Ministry of Word and Sacrament, as much as the professors who had taught me at seminary, as much as supporters both who had experienced my ministry and those who had not, and as much as I did. Second, throughout the candidacy process, I was very honest with my home Synod in Wisconsin about my feelings and reflections, both about the process and the future of the church, some of which were not the most positive. The candidacy process for me in the ELCA was not always a smooth road due to this and other factors. As a result, I did not feel supported throughout the process.

I do not hold any grudge or any ill will toward the ELCA. Even in situations where I wish that leadership would have supported me more or in different ways, there are no hard feelings.

Overall, I am thrilled that my ministry journey is able to continue. It is my belief that we are all one communal church under God, and, regardless of the label of denomination, we are all siblings in Christ. As I like to joke, I will continue following what I perceive as God's will for my life and my call to ministry, and, if I am on the wrong path, then I hope that God will send the whale to straighten everything out!

From the Director of Faith Formation

Then the daughters of Zelophehad came forward. Zelophehad was son of Hepher son of Gilead son of Machir son of Manasseh son of Joseph, a member of the Manassite clans. The names of his daughters were: Mahlah, Noah, Hoglah, Milcah, and Tirzah. They stood before Moses, Eleazar the priest, the leaders, and all the congregation, at the entrance of the tent of meeting, and they said, "Our father died in the wilderness; he was not among the company of those who gathered themselves together against the LORD in the company of Korah, but died for his own sin; and he had no sons. Why should the name of our father be taken away from his clan because he had no son? Give to us a possession among our father's brothers." Moses brought their case before the LORD. And the LORD spoke to Moses, saying: The daughters of Zelophehad are right in what they are saying; you shall indeed let them possess an inheritance among their father's brothers and pass the inheritance of their father on to them. (Numbers 27: 1-7)

This is one of my most beloved Bible stories. The five sisters had no legal standing; in fact, you might even say they had nothing in their favor in the situation. They had each other, they had truth, and they had the fear and love of the Lord their God. Because they stood and worked together, because they had the courage to ask for what is just, and because they did not except an unjust system, they received justice in the grace and love of the Lord their God.

This summer I ask that we stand together to overcome the struggles of our new reality amongst COVID-19. We need you. Yes, you. We need help with leading worship as Lectors, Song Leaders, Ushers, being a Zoom greeter, and working the technology for livestreaming. The Lord your God is calling you to serve your community of faith. This summer I ask that we stand together against injustice in our city. On July 7th, Pastor Martin Rafanan will be hosting an adult education conversation about Bethel AME congregation in the Hill District and their nearly 75-year struggle with the city of Pittsburgh for what is just. I hope you will join us to learn and hear God's call for justice.

Jesus is calling, calling you to the table he has laid before you. Jesus is calling you the imperfect, you created in the one image; to come and go; to serve and be served. Jesus is calling. Amen, and Amen.

Coming to St. Andrew's Front Lawn—The Mini Free Pantry Give What You Can / Take What You Need

Modeled after the Little Library Movement, the Mini Free Pantry Movement began as a grassroots effort to help address food insecurities in neighborhoods across the country and around the world. St. Andrew's Community Ministry committee has been placing shelf-safe food items in our Little Library for a while. When an online news article about the Mini Free Pantry came to their attention, they decided, "Why not!" A grant was applied for and awarded from the Southwestern Pennsylvania Synod. Scott Gaugler jumped into action and built the pantry. Soon it will be installed in our front lawn not from the Little Library.

We still have funding left over to buy inventory and we have received some donations from some of our St Andrew family (Thank you to Leanne Paetz for donating her Thrivent gift card, and to John and Dixie Tymitz and Sue & Scott Gaugler for purchasing and storing inventory.). Volunteers will be needed soon to help in keeping the pantry stocked and orderly. Here are some ways you can help:

- Come to church a little early or stay a little bit afterward to see what is in the pantry and what may need to be replenished. You can take one Sunday a month (like previous coffee hour help, but easier!) or you can offer to cover just once or twice a quarter. There is no need to purchase anything. The pantry can be filled from our inventory.
- Team up with another family and be a tag-team to share your week on an every-other-week basis.
- Easy Peasy: When you go shopping, buy an extra item or two of what you buy for yourself (see notes at the bottom for items that can be used). Bring your items when you come to church and Joyce Compton or Sue Gaugler will get everything into the inventory. This can be an anonymous way of helping if you desire.
- We also still have books for the Little library if you wood prefer to help keep it full of books.
- These volunteer activities could be great family project. Talk to your kids about food insecurity and let them help you pick out items to shop for or to help fill the pantry.
- And —We can keep calling it The Mini Free Pantry, or it can be renamed. The movement leaves that open to our discretion. If you have a suggestion, let us know.

Below is a list of items we will be looking for. Keep in mind the population we might be serving in our neighborhood: people experiencing homeless, college students low on funding, immigrant students and families, anyone facing food insecurity due to job loss or the pandemic. Items should be shelf safe (nothing fresh, frozen or that may go bad in severe weather). Here are some things we suggest:

- Items in cans with flip top lids (nothing requiring a can opener): Tuna, sardines, or Vienna sausage, ravioli, soup that does not need to be diluted
- Fruit or vegetables in single serve, shelf-safe containers
- Single serve peanut butter, cheese & cracker snacks, granola bars, beef jerky, raisin boxes, little cereal boxes, shelf stable milk (Horizon)
- Bottled water
- Plastic utensils, single serve condiment and seasoning packets
- Some full-size products that have also been taken are cake mix & puddings mixes.
- Also consider things for one or two people who are food insecure but who do have shelter and a way to cook like stuffing mix, noodle, or rice mixes in packets, past sauce, cereal.
- Personal care items: Shampoo, body wash, deodorant, toothpaste, feminine products, and toilet paper.

2021 Southwestern Pennsylvania Synod Assembly Recap

St. Andrew is a member congregation of the Southwestern Pennsylvania Synod (a word that comes from the Greek for a "way, road, or path together"), which met in it annual assembly from Thursday, June 10th through Saturday, June 12th. This year's theme was "On Purpose — Faithful and Fulfilling Lives." Here is a summary of the synod assembly's actions:

- Elected the following voting members to the 2022 ELCA Churchwide Assembly: Rev. Kerri Clark, Rev. Beth Clementson, Rev. Brenda Henry, Tom Hough, Dennis Lane, Rev. Martha McCreight, Rev.
