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+ Third Sunday after Pentecost Order for Worship

The mustard seed becomes a great shrub that shelters the birds, recalling ancient images of the tree of life. We would expect a cedar or a sequoia, but Jesus compares the reign of God to a tiny, no-account seed. It's not the way we expect divine activity to look. Yet the tree of life is here, in the cross around which we gather, the tree into which we are grafted through Baptism, the true vine that nourishes us with its fruit in the cup we share. It may not appear all that impressive, but while nobody's looking it grows with a power beyond our understanding.

A few notes on precautions and protocols, which apply to everyone regardless of vaccination status, as St. Andrew returns to worship in the sanctuary:

- Name and contact information will be recorded for all worshipers in attendance in case the need for contact tracing should arise.
- Face masks that fully cover both your mouth and nose are required at all times for everyone over the age of two (2) the only exception being the brief moment of moving mask aside to partake in Holy Communion.
- Outside food and drink are thus not permissible during worship.
- Physical distancing of at least six (6) feet will be observed at all times for people not from your household.
- Singing and corporate prayer spoken in unison will not be a part of the worship service. Both of these practices have been proven to increase the amount of droplets in the air, potentially facilitating the spread of the coronavirus. We will pray and share music during worship, but we ask that you pray/follow along silently or whisper under your mask.
- We ask that everyone use hand sanitizer, either your own or from the bottles throughout the sanctuary, especially prior to Holy Communion.

⁶So we are always confident; even though we know that while we are at home in the body we are away from the Lord—⁷for we walk by faith, not by sight. ⁸Yes, we do have confidence, and we would rather be away from the body and at home with the Lord. ⁹So whether we are at home or away, we make it our aim to please the Lord. ¹⁰For all of us must appear before the judgment seat of Christ, so that each may receive recompense for what has been done in the body, whether good or evil.

Holy Communion

- For Holy Communion, we will not be kneeling at the altar rail due to the need for physical distancing.
- At the invitation of the usher, worshipers from the pulpit side will proceed forward first, followed by the center section, and then the lectern side.
- The Communion bread/wafer is in small cups on the left side of the altar table as you come forward. Cups of wine (lighter liquid) and grape juice (darker liquid) are on your right.
- A blessing will be provided for anyone who does not yet receive the sacrament, following physical distancing guidelines.
- Everyone is asked to wait until you return to your place to consume the wafer and wine/grape juice, and then promptly replace your mask.
- Worshipers can place the paper cups in the receptacle by the door at the back of the sanctuary as they leave through the Centre and Morewood Ave. vestibule.
