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+ Sixteenth Sunday after Pentecost Order for Worship

In Mark's Gospel, we hear Peter's confession of faith when he says to Jesus:
"You are the Messiah." In John, the stumbling block to people seeking to follow Jesus
was the invitation to eat his flesh, given for the life of the world. In Mark, too, the scandal has to
do with Jesus' words about his own coming death. Here Peter himself stumbles over Jesus'
words. But Jesus is anointed (the meaning of messiah) in Mark only on the way to the cross
(14:3). So are we anointed in Baptism to follow Jesus in the way of selfless love.
Today is also God's Work; Our Hands Sunday, when St. Andrew and congregations across the
Evangelical Lutheran Church in America engage in service to our neighbors.

A few notes on precautions and protocols, which apply to everyone regardless of vaccination status, as St. Andrew returns to worship in the sanctuary:

- Face masks that fully cover both your mouth and nose are required at all times for everyone over the age of two (2) the only exception being the brief moment of moving mask aside to partake in Holy Communion.
- Outside food and drink are thus not permissible during worship.
- Physical distancing of at least six (6) feet will be observed at all times for people not from your household.
- We invite the congregation to voice responses and prayers during worship. A cantor will sing the hymns with a mask on, and the rest of the congregation is encouraged to follow along silently.
- We ask that everyone use hand sanitizer, either your own or from the bottles throughout the sanctuary, especially prior to Holy Communion.

Worship Services are live streamed to multiple online platforms. By attending worship, you agree that your image and voice may be broadcast.

⁴The Lord GOD has given me the tongue of a teacher, that I may know how to sustain the weary with a word.

wakens my ear to listen as those who are taught.

⁶I gave my back to those who struck me, and my cheeks to those who pulled out the beard; I did not hide my face from insult and spitting.

Second Reading – James 3: 1-12

¹Not many of you should become teachers, my kindred, for you know that we who teach will be judged with greater strictness. ²For all of us make many mistakes. Anyone who makes no mistakes in speaking is perfect, able to keep the whole body in check with a bridle. ³If we put bits into the mouths of horses to make them obey us, we guide their whole bodies. ⁴Or look at ships: though they are so large that it takes strong winds to drive them, yet they are guided by a very small rudder wherever the will of the pilot directs. ⁵So also the tongue is a small member, yet it boasts of great exploits.

How great a forest is set ablaze by a small fire! ⁶And the tongue is a fire. The tongue is placed among our members as a world of iniquity; it stains the whole body, sets on fire the cycle of nature, and is itself set on fire by hell. ⁷For every species of beast and bird, of reptile and sea creature, can be tamed and has been tamed by the human species, ⁸but no one can tame the tongue—a restless evil, full of deadly poison. ⁹With it we bless the Lord and Father, and with it we curse those who are made in the likeness of God. ¹⁰From the same mouth come blessing and cursing. My siblings, this ought not to be so. ¹¹Does a spring pour forth from the same opening both fresh and brackish water? ¹²Can a fig tree, my kindred, yield olives, or a grapevine figs? No more can salt water yield fresh?

L: The Word of the Lord. C: Thanks be to God.

²⁷Jesus went on with his disciples to the villages of Caesarea Philippi; and on the way he asked his disciples, "Who do people say that I am?" ²⁸And they answered him, "John the Baptist; and others, Elijah; and still others, one of the prophets." ²⁹He asked them, "But who do you say that I am?" Peter answered him, "You are the Messiah." ³⁰And he sternly ordered them not to tell anyone about him.

³¹Then he began to teach them that the Son of Humanity must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again. ³²He said all this quite openly. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. ³³But turning and looking at his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said, "Get behind me, Satan! For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things."

³⁴He called the crowd with his disciples, and said to them, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. ³⁵For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it. ³⁶For what will it profit them to gain the whole world and forfeit their life? ³⁷Indeed, what can they give in return for their life? ³⁸Those who are ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of them the Son of Humanity will also be ashamed when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels."

P: The Gospel of the Lord. C: Praise to you, O Christ.

Presentation and Blessing of Bibles

Children entering third and fourth grade, along with those beginning Confirmation class, are invited to come forward to the baptismal font.

P: Julian, Giovanni, Lucia, Oliver, Bennett, Lily, and Nicholas, who is joining us online: At your Baptism, your parents, godparents, pastor, and the whole congregation surround you with love and prayers as God's promises were poured out on you in water and the Word. Your parents promised to place in your hands the holy Scriptures, what we call the Bible. As you receive your Bible today, we pray that God's living Word will continue to speak to you and lead you in God's ways of new life.

As each person receives a Bible from their parents, the pastor says:

P: <u>Name</u>, receive this Bible. May God's life-giving word inspire you and make you wise. *The congregation responds with affirmation:*

When all have received their Bible, the presiding minister speaks briefly about the gift of God's Word. The people of the congregation are then invited to lift up their own Bibles for the blessing. P: Hear God's Word together.

Holy Communion

- For Holy Communion, we will not be kneeling at the altar rail due to the need for physical distancing.
- At the invitation of the usher, worshipers from the pulpit side will proceed forward first, followed by the center section, and then the lectern side.
- The Communion bread/wafer is in small cups on the left side of the altar table as you come forward. Cups of wine (lighter liquid) and grape juice (darker liquid) are on your right.
- A blessing will be provided for anyone who does not yet receive the sacrament, following physical distancing guidelines.

- Everyone is asked to wait until you return to your place to consume the wafer and wine/grape juice, and then promptly replace your mask.
- Worshipers can place the paper cups in the receptacle by the door at the back of the sanctuary as they leave through the Centre and Morewood Ave. vestibule.
