## From the Pastor

Dear People of St. Andrew,
For many in the Pittsburgh area, the beginning of a new school year has once again been fraught with uncertainty, with arguments and adjustments over start dates and safety requirements. This naturally leaves many people frustrated and disappointed, if they even have time to think of that as they scramble to make everything work in their schedules. I have had conversations recently and seen posts online in which some have suggested that the constancy of change seems to be the only certainty we have anymore. When this is the case, when so few of our hopes or expectations are met, when we are bereft of certain comforting routines we could once rely on, it is natural to feel unsettled, and it can be especially challenging when this state continues on for as long as it has.

Though we may not always like it, ongoing change can have benefits, as well. Our faith can be a balm in times of trouble, but as Scripture indicates, it is also meant to grow and mature. God's work among us is dynamic. I am thankful for the old saying, "God loves you exactly as you are and loves you too much to have you stay that way." Jesus and his first disciples never stayed in one place for long-they were seemingly always on the move, and Jesus' followers were constantly being challenged to learn and see things differently along the way. The same is true for us as we continue living into our baptismal promises each day. Our community of faith and the liturgy we engage in together are never static, but consistently reforming and evolving as we seek to be faithful in our time and context. With this is mind, as we enter a new "program year" in the church, I would like to share some developments and updates on our plans for worship and Christian Education in the upcoming months.

This past year, our church's publishing house, Augsburg Fortress, released a new hymnal called All Creation Sings. This supplement to Evangelical Lutheran Worship contains two new liturgies, prayer and other liturgical resources, and 200 new hymns. Since we currently have only one cantor singing the hymns on Sundays, now is an opportune time to slowly introduce new hymns from this resource, which we will begin doing this month.
We will be making some other changes to worship in the weeks to come, also. The first will be to reverse the order of the Welcome and the Prelude. When we began live streaming worship from the sanctuary, it made sense to begin with music as a means of transition for people tuning in online. Now we post an online countdown to the service, which allows space for ambient noise, the sound of parishioners gathering, and perhaps additional music, so the prelude, which sets a tone for the service, can be returned to its natural place after the welcome to help the assembly with focus, centering, prayer, and preparation for worship.

The second change will be in the area of Holy Communion. Our current setup for distribution has worked relatively well but still has an unnatural, what some have termed "clinical" feel to it. We find ourselves separated from one another with a second altar between parishioners and those who are serving and lose a sense of the unity intended in the meal. St. Andrew's worship committee recently learned of another method of distribution which would allow us to offer distribution in a sanitary manner while still moving forward in recovering a more familiar and communal celebration of the sacrament. This method involves hosts (bread-both regular and gluten -free) prepared ahead of time with a drop of either wine or grape juice on them, maintaining the reception of Communion in both kinds. The hosts can then be distributed by the pastor (using tongs to ensure sanitary delivery) directly to the person receiving the sacrament. Our plan is to introduce this method of Communion distribution during worship on Sunday, September $19^{\text {th }}$. We ask your openness to this change on a trial basis, with the understanding that it may be necessary to make future adjustments to our plans.

On that note, St. Andrew previously announced the plan for "Little Church; Big Faith" Christian Education activities for our youngest children (up to third grade) to take place during the Sunday worship service. Given our current circumstances, it made sense to change our approach in order to better serve St. Andrew's people. Beginning this month, "Little Church; Big Faith" will instead be a pre-recorded video released online on Saturdays at 10:00 a.m., giving families an opportunity to take part in faith formation activities at their convenience throughout each weekend. Director of Faith Formation Chris Atwood will deliver resource kits to households with children in this age group to assist with these activities.

Amid all that is changing around us, this past Sunday's second reading from James offers assurance in the promises of God "with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change." We look ahead in trust and hope, confident in the one who holds our future, whose love and grace are steadfast and sure.

There are more opportunities to contribute and helping can be simple and rewarding. Here are ways to join in:

- Give a donation in any denomination. Just add it to your weekly offering and add "Little Pantry" in the memo line of your check.
- Wrap sets of plastic utensils (fork, spoon, and knife) in a napkin and place each in a small zip lock baggie. Place it on the pantry food shelves in the Social Hall.
- Buy an extra item for the pantry while shopping. Look for a cart of discounted food that is pantry appropriate. Most groceries will have one somewhere in the store.
- If you are a Thrivent member, consider applying for a Thrivent Action Team Gift card and designate Little Free Pantry as the project. (Ask Joyce Compton or Sue Gaugler about how to do this.)
- Sign up to serve as a Pantry Attendant. You can choose a month of Sundays or Wednesdays to fill up the Pantry from our donation shelves (Roughly 30-60 minutes). Team up with another family to split the days .

Below is a list of items to stock the pantry: Keep in mind the population we might be serving in our neighborhood: people experiencing homeless, college students low on funding, immigrant students and families, anyone facing food insecurity due to job loss or the pandemic. Items should be shelf safe (nothing fresh, frozen or that may go bad in severe weather). Here are some things we suggest:

- Items in cans with flip top lids (nothing requiring a can opener): Tuna, sardines, or Vienna sausage, ravioli, soup that does not need to be diluted
- Fruit or vegetables in single serve, shelf-safe containers
- Single serve peanut butter, cheese \& cracker snacks, granola bars, beef jerky, raisin boxes, little cereal boxes, shelf stable milk (Horizon)
- Bottled water
- Plastic utensils, single serve condiment and seasoning packets
- Some full-size products that have also been taken are cake mix \& puddings mixes.
- Also consider things for one or two people who are food insecure but who do have shelter and a way to cook like stuffing mix, noodle, or rice mixes in packets, past sauce, cereal.
- Personal care items: Shampoo, body wash, deodorant, toothpaste, feminine products, and toilet paper.


## The "Overground Railroad" A Movement to Help Immigrants on the Move Infant and Toddler Clothing and Shoes Needed

The "Overground Railroad," organized by Grannies Respond /Abuelas Responden, coordinates volunteers to meet asylum seekers at bus stations across the U.S. as they make their journey from the border to their final destination. Families arrive with very few (or no) belongings and usually have young children. Grannies/Abuelas would like to have some children's clothing on hand, because young children may have an accident on the long journey, and often have no change of clothes with them. St. Andrew seeks to support Grannies Respond/ Abuelas Responden with clothing for infants and toddlers up to age three only and gently worn or new children shoes in Little Kids' sizes, 2-10 only. Donations can be brought to St. Andrew on an ongoing basis. Please do not bring any other clothing to church-we have nowhere to take it for donation.

## Earthquake Relief in Haiti

"I call upon you, for you will answer me, O God; incline your ear to me, hear my words" (Psalm 17:6).
A devastating 7.2 magnitude earthquake struck southwest Haiti on Saturday, August $14^{\text {th }}$. Over 1,400 people were killed, and that number is expected to increase as search-and-rescue efforts continue. Blocked roads are delaying the delivery of vital supplies to hospitals, which are overwhelmed with more than 6,900 injured people. At least 26,000 homes were damaged or destroyed, but the full extent of damage is still unknown. Haiti is also suffering through a political crisis and was hit by Tropical Storm Grace on Monday night, which caused severe flooding in communities already damaged by the earthquake.

For over two decades, the ELCA has maintained a presence in southern Haiti through support for agricultural and sustainable development work. To continue our engagement with those communities, Lutheran Disaster Response is collaborating with partner organizations in the communities to meet relief needs, including food, water, medical supplies and temporary shelter. In the future, other areas of support will include psychosocial care, water and sanitation, and creating sustainable livelihoods through agriculture and livestock. We also stand with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Haiti as it assesses damage and impacts on churches and church life.

Your gifts will support earthquake survivors in Haiti. Gifts to "Haiti Crisis" will be used in full (100\%) to assist those affected by the earthquake.
