In the fifteenth year of the reign of Emperor Tiberius, when Pontius Pilate was governor of Judea, and Herod was ruler of Galilee, and his brother Philip ruler of the region of Ituraea and Trachonitis, and Lysanias ruler of Abilene, <sup>2</sup>during the high priesthood of Annas and Caiaphas, the word of God came to John son of Zechariah in the wilderness.

He went to be registered with Mary, to whom he was engaged, and who was expecting a child. Luke 2: 1-5

We have likely all seen headlines or heard news reports about current troubles with the global supply chain and concerns about its effects on our economy. We hear of people's inability to find certain products and the steeper prices paid for others. We have probably felt some of this ourselves, whether at the grocery store or the gas station. At this time of year when so much of our society is focused on buying, spending, and gift-giving, such news leads to dire proclamations like the one above about "ruined Christmas." Media and others look to public figures like the president, either for solutions or to place blame, as if one person could have an outsized effect on such interconnected global dynamics during a pandemic. Like people throughout history, we put our trust and hope, especially for comfort and security, in all the wrong places.

Our Scripture readings for this Advent and Christmas invite us to see things differently. John the Baptist came along during the time of all the powerful political leaders Luke mentions to proclaim that God's people should turn from their current ways and look to the one who was coming, the humble teacher from God who would re-order the world. Isaiah, speaking in a time of instability amid a nation divided, declares that God is the one and only source of salvation in whom they can place their trust. Mary, upon hearing the news that she will bear the child Jesus, celebrates God's greatness and sings as if God's promises are already fulfilled, not only for her but for all God's people. As she and Joseph prepare for the birth of the child, they are beholden to the decisions of their government, its economic system and taxation, which demands that they travel far from home to be registered. Christmas does not always happen the way we planned.

In this broken world, we so often place expectations on our leaders, our political structures, our economic systems, looking to them to save us from our troubles or bring us the good life. Yet as Isaiah and Mary remind us, all we need, all that God has promised, has already been fulfilled. We find our joy in the presence of God who has done great things for us and will continue to do so. Mary and Joseph, God's people throughout the ages, and this world God loves have all faced difficult circumstances around Christmas before, as some are right now, troubles far more dire than not getting a consumer product on time. The Christ child still arrives. God continues to come among us. Christmas is still celebrated, and the angels still sing: "Do not be afraid—for see, I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people. To you is born a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord. Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth, peace among those God favors."

## **Being Good Stewards of our Church Grounds**

Those of you who have been able to attend worship in person may have noticed some changes in the appearance of our church grounds. In addition to weeding our flower beds, volunteers have been working on removing the invasive plants that have been gradually taking over the grounds. The worst offenders are porcelain berry vines and Amur honeysuckle shrubs, which are now recognized as undesirable invasive plants. Birds eat their berries, which are the avian equivalent of junk food, and then deposit the seeds far and wide in their droppings. New plants readily sprout and quickly displace the native plants, doing serious harm to the ecosystem. We are finishing the removal of the invasive plants and plan to begin replacing them with appropriate noninvasive plants next spring.
