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+ First Sunday of Advent Order for Worship

Advent is about the "coming days." God's people have always lived in great expectation, but that expectation finds specific, repeated enunciation in the texts appointed for these four weeks. The ancients anticipated a "righteous Branch to spring up for David." The Thessalonians awaited "the coming of our Lord Jesus with all the saints." Jesus' contemporaries hoped for the time "to stand before the Son of Humanity." With them we eagerly await the coming days: another Christmas celebration, a second coming, and the advent of Christ in word and supper.

A few notes on precautions and protocols, which apply to everyone regardless of vaccination status, as St. Andrew returns to worship in the sanctuary:

- Face masks that fully cover both your mouth and nose are required at all times for everyone over the age of two (2) the only exception being the brief moment of moving mask aside to partake in Holy Communion.
- Outside food and drink are thus not permissible during worship.
- Physical distancing of at least six (6) feet will be observed at all times for people not from your household.
- We invite the congregation to voice responses and prayers during worship. A cantor will sing the hymns with a mask on, and the rest of the congregation is encouraged to follow along silently.
- We ask that everyone use hand sanitizer, either your own or from the bottles throughout the sanctuary, especially prior to Holy Communion.

Worship Services are live streamed to multiple online platforms. By attending worship, you agree that your image and voice may be broadcast.

Lighting the Advent Wreath

One of the best-known customs for the season of Advent is the Advent wreath. The wreath and winter candle-lighting in the midst of growing darkness in the Northern Hemisphere strengthen some of the Advent images found in the Bible. The unbroken circle of greens is intended as an image of everlasting life, a victory wreath, the crown of Christ, and/or the wheel of time. Christians use the wreath as a sign that Christ reaches into our time to lead us to the light of everlasting life. The four candles mark the progress of the four weeks of Advent and the growth of light. In many homes, the family gathers for prayers around the wreath – as we gather in worship as a congregation each week, we progressively light the candles of the wreath and pray together.

P: Let us pray. Blessed are you, O God our righteousness, for you fulfill your promises to the house of Israel and the house of Judah, and proclaim that your day of justice and salvation is dawning.

As we light the first candle on this wreath, help us to be alert in watching for the day of the Lord's coming. Strengthen us in holiness, increase our love for one another and for all, and direct our way in all things to you. **C: Amen.**

P: O house of David, come,

C: Let us prepare for the day of redemption drawing near.

We ask that those present in the church sanctuary refrain from singing the hymns aloud. The assembly gathered from afar is encouraged to sing!

The presiding minister will distribute one to each communicant from the ciborium using sanitary tongs.
- When you reach the presiding minister, please indicate if you would like grape juice or a gluten-free wafer.

- A blessing will be provided for anyone who does not yet receive the sacrament, following physical distancing guidelines.
- Everyone is asked to wait until you return to your place to consume the elements, and then promptly replace your mask.
