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+ Second Sunday of Advent Order for Worship

Forerunners and messengers prepare for the advent of our God.

While John the baptizer's voice in the wilderness may be the principal focus of the day,

Malachi's prophecy could as easily herald the coming Christ as forerunner of the LORD of hosts.

Finally, all the baptized are called to participate in the sharing of the gospel.

In so doing we prepare the way for the coming of Jesus

and assist all people in capturing a vision of the "salvation of God."

A few notes on precautions and protocols, which apply to everyone regardless of vaccination status, as St. Andrew returns to worship in the sanctuary:

- Face masks that fully cover both your mouth and nose are required at all times for everyone over the age of two (2) the only exception being the brief moment of moving mask aside to partake in Holy Communion.
- Outside food and drink are thus not permissible during worship.
- Physical distancing of at least six (6) feet will be observed at all times for people not from your household.
- We invite the congregation to voice responses and prayers during worship. A cantor will sing the hymns with a mask on, and the rest of the congregation is encouraged to follow along silently.
- We ask that everyone use hand sanitizer, either your own or from the bottles throughout the sanctuary, especially prior to Holy Communion.

Worship Services are live streamed to multiple online platforms. By attending worship, you agree that your image and voice may be broadcast.

Lighting the Advent Wreath

One of the best-known customs for the season of Advent is the Advent wreath. The wreath and winter candle-lighting in the midst of growing darkness in the Northern Hemisphere strengthen some of the Advent images found in the Bible. The unbroken circle of greens is intended as an image of everlasting life, a victory wreath, the crown of Christ, and/or the wheel of time. Christians use the wreath as a sign that Christ reaches into our time to lead us to the light of everlasting life. The four candles mark the progress of the four weeks of Advent and the growth of light. In many homes, the family gathers for prayers around the wreath — as we gather in worship as a congregation each week, we progressively light the candles of the wreath and pray together.

P: Let us pray. Blessed are you, Lord, the God of Israel, for you send messengers to prepare the way of your coming among us. You have raised up for us a Savior, shown mercy to our forebears, and remembered your holy covenant, offering the promise of hope for all people.

As we light these candles, turn our wills to bear the fruit of repentance and to follow in your way of righteousness. Shine on those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death, and guide our feet into the way of peace.

C: Amen.

P: O people of hope, come,

C: Let us rejoice in the faithfulness of the Lord.

We ask that those present in the church sanctuary refrain from singing the hymns aloud.

The assembly gathered from afar is encouraged to sing!

First Reading – Malachi 3: 1-4

¹See, I am sending my messenger to prepare the way before me, and the Lord whom you seek will suddenly come to his temple. The messenger of the covenant in whom you delight—indeed, he is coming, says the LORD of hosts. ²But who can endure the day of his coming, and who can stand when he appears?

For he is like a refiner's fire and like fullers' soap; ³he will sit as a refiner and purifier of silver, and he will purify the descendants of Levi and refine them like gold and silver, until they present offerings to the LORD in righteousness. ⁴Then the offering of Judah and Jerusalem will be pleasing to the LORD as in the days of old and as in former years.

The responsive reading from Luke's Gospel, known as the Benedictus after the blessing in the first line, will be led by the cantor, with the congregation responding with the verses indicated in bold.

³I thank my God every time I remember you, ⁴constantly praying with joy in every one of my prayers for all of you, ⁵because of your sharing in the gospel from the first day until now. ⁶I am confident of this, that the one who began a good work among you will bring it to completion by the day of Jesus Christ. ⁷It is right for me to think this way about all of you, because you hold me in your heart, for all of you share in God's grace with me, both in my imprisonment and in the defense and confirmation of the gospel. ⁸For God is my witness, how I long for all of you with the compassion of Christ Jesus. ⁹And this is my prayer, that your love may overflow more and more with knowledge and full insight ¹⁰to help you to determine what is best, so that in the day of Christ you may be pure and blameless, ¹¹having produced the harvest of righteousness that comes through Jesus Christ for the glory and praise of God.

- A blessing will be provided for anyone who does not yet receive the sacrament, following physical distancing guidelines.
