+ All Saints Sunday Order for Worship

All Saints celebrates the baptized people of God, living and dead, who are the body of Christ. As November heralds the dying of the landscape in many northern regions, the readings and liturgy call us to remember all who have died in Christ and whose baptism is complete. At the Lord's table we gather with the faithful of every time and place, trusting that the promises of God will be fulfilled and that all tears will be wiped away in the new Jerusalem.

Welcome to St. Andrew!

- St. Andrew Lutheran congregation welcomes all who are seeking a place of healing and wholeness a nurturing, faith-forming spiritual home. Our community embraces people of all ages, ethnicities, cultures, abilities, sexual orientations, gender identities and expressions, and family constellations. Come and See!
- Worship Services are live streamed to multiple online platforms. By attending worship, you agree that your image and voice may be broadcast.
- Everyone is invited to make a nametag at the black bookcase in the back of the worship space if they would like. There are stickers indicating pronouns on the bookcase if you would like to include them on your name tag.
- Worship "toolkits" to help children engage with the service, along with "busy bags" for younger children, are available in the bookcase at the back of the sanctuary. Please feel free to take one to use with/for your children.
- Children are invited to attend Little Church Big Faith, a Bible lesson and activity, during worship (after the Prayer of the Day). The group returns to the worship space for the liturgy of Holy Communion.
- Holy Communion is served with bread (gluten-free available) and wine or grape juice. The presiding minister will distribute the bread (host). Please consume this and then pick up an empty glass from the tray. The Communion Assistant will pour wine or grape juice into your glass. Please step to the side to consume the wine or grape juice. Feel free to kneel at the altar for prayer and reflection. As you return to your pew, glasses may be returned to the empty trays on either side of the center section.
- A restroom is available on the main level of the church, through the doors to the Social Hall and to the right in the main office.





Sermon

A time of silence for prayer and reflection follows the sermon.

All Saints Remembrance

The names the faithful departed are read.

Organ chimes ring before and after the name of each member of the St. Andrew community who has joined the communion of saints in the past year, since the last All Saints Sunday. As the presiding minister reads the names of family and friends of the congregation who have died, the Hymn of the Day, "For All the Saints," begins.

During this time, people of the congregation are invited to come forward as you feel moved to light a candle and place it in the sand in memory of your loved ones.

St. Andrew Lutheran Church Announcements November 5th, 2023

• Welcome to Worship at St. Andrew on All Saints Sunday, November 5th, 2023 – We are so glad you are here, and we offer a special welcome to all guests who are gathered here or online!

This week, the church observes All Saints Sunday, when we give thanks for all the saints, both the living, and those who have gone before us, who have inspired and taught us by their examples of faith, love, grace, and baptismal living. For many, this is a day on which to remember those who have gone before us. During worship, we will honor the faithful departed who have gone on into God's eternal care since the past year's All Saints Sunday. As we do, we offer people of the congregation the opportunity to light a candle in memory of loved ones, as we remember the promise that God keeps us connected to them in the communion of all the saints.

Worship attendees are invited to make a name tag at the back of the worship space if you would like. Children are invited to participate in Little Church – Big Faith, a Bible lesson and activity, after the prayer of the day. There are worship "toolkits" to help children engage with worship and "busy bags" for younger children available in the bookcase at the back of the sanctuary. Please feel free to take one to use with/for your children. We invite everyone to stay after worship for coffee and conversation in the Social Hall next to the sanctuary.

- Monthly Reparations Offering Today during Worship Jesus' parable of the compassionate Samaritan from Luke's Gospel provides an example of how God's people are called to work for healing and repair for our neighbors, independent of who or what caused harm. In light of this, St. Andrew has made a commitment to reparations in regard to African American spiritual songs used in our worship. The text and music of most hymns is attributed to specific authors, with copyrights in place, usage reported, and royalties paid to those whose works are featured in worship. With African American spirituals, this is not possible. In response to many years of such uncredited use, St. Andrew will invite people of the congregation to give to a second collection for reparations during the offering. Funds received in our collections will be donated to our siblings at Bethel AME Church, whose land and building were taken from them in the 1950s, to fund the development they are planning in the lower Hill District.
- Bible Study on "The Chosen" with Pastor Paul Koch Begins Today after Worship! The Chosen is an online television series based on the Gospels of Jesus Christ, with some locations and timelines combined, condensed, or interpreted, and some dialogue and backstory added. Pastor Paul Koch will be leading this study in which we will consider Gospel texts, compare and contrast them with "The Chosen," and invite further consideration of how we engage with the stories of Jesus. We will highlight specific sections in our Sunday discussions so feel free to attend even if you have not watched the show. The series is available for free at the official website, <u>https://new.thechosen.tv</u>/, or using The Chosen app. It can also be found on YouTube, Amazon Prime, and other streaming services. We will continue the study on Sundays, November 12th and 19th and may add additional weeks if there is sufficient interest and participation.

- Collecting Thanksgiving Food Items for November Produce Distribution until Tuesday Afternoon, November 7th St. Andrew once again plans to offer supplementary Thanksgiving foods for people of the community during the November Produce Distribution this Tuesday, November 7th. We are asking for donations of:
 - Stuffing mix
 - Instant mashed potatoes
 - Cornbread mix
 - Brownie or cake mix
 - Other staples such as lentils, beans, and rice

Canned vegetables have already been purchased and are not needed. Items can be donated on the large table next to the pantry supplies in the Social Hall.

- Fresh Produce Distribution Tuesday, November 7th, 5:30-7:00 p.m. Each month, St. Andrew offers a community fresh produce distribution in partnership with Greater Pittsburgh Community Food Bank. The next date is Tuesday, November 7th, from 5:30-7:00 p.m. We invite people of the congregation to help serve during the distribution, welcoming and helping guests, rotating boxes, directing traffic, etc. during that time, and earlier in the day for setup and unloading of the truck, usually between 10:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. Those who sign up for the earlier time will be contacted the day before when we have an estimate of the delivery time. - Camp Lutherlyn "Building for the Future" Campaign Continues St. Andrew has been participating in an ongoing campaign to raise money for Lutherlyn in Prospect, PA. Lutherlyn is a camp, beloved by generations in this area, which has been integral in supporting the faith of children, youth, and adults and forming leaders for the church's mission. Their goal is to fund two new five-cabin villages, one of which will replace well-used cabins from 1958, and to renew and preserve the Steininger Memorial Amphitheater, and outdoor worship space. Lutherlyn is asking for commitments from individuals, families, foundations, and congregations to fund its initiatives, and *we will offer an opportunity to dedicate these commitments during worship on Sunday, November 19th*. Please continue to follow the fliers with your Sunday bulletins and prayerfully consider how God may be calling you to support the life-changing ministries of Lutherlyn, "A God-given place to be accepted, challenged, and sent."
- Compline Prayer Service, a Ministry of Lutheran Campus Ministry in Greater Pittsburgh, Sundays at 8:00 p.m. at Heinz Chapel – Compline was traditionally a monastic prayer service, and the Pittsburgh Compline Choir sings a choral version of compline rooted in this thousand-year-old tradition of scripture, song, and silence. This service also streams on Facebook (Pittsburgh Compline Choir) and YouTube (The Pittsburgh Compline Choir). Heinz Chapel is located off of S. Bellefield Ave. in Oakland.
