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+ Twentieth Sunday after Pentecost Order for Worship

Today's Gospel combines a saying that may make many of us uncomfortable with a story many find comforting. Jesus' saying on divorce is another of his rejections of human legislation in favor of the original intent of God's law. Jesus' rebuke of the disciples who are fending off the children should challenge us as well. What does it mean to receive the reign of God as a child does?

 Please step to the side to consume the wine or grape juice. Feel free to kneel at the altar for prayer
 and reflection. As you return to your pew, glasses may be returned to the empty trays on either
 side of the center section.

Second Reading – Hebrews 1: 1-4; 2: 5-12

¹Long ago God spoke to our ancestors in many and various ways by the prophets, ²but in these last days God has spoken to us by a Son, whom God appointed heir of all things, through whom God also created the worlds. ³[Jesus] is the reflection of God's glory and the exact imprint of God's very being, and he sustains all things by his powerful word. When he had made purification for sins, he sat down at the right hand of the Majesty on high, ⁴having become as much superior to angels as the name he has inherited is more excellent than theirs.

^{2:5}Now God did not subject the coming world, about which we are speaking, to angels. ⁶But someone has testified somewhere,

"What are human beings that you are mindful of them, or mortals, that you care for them?

⁷You have made them for a little while lower than the angels;

you have crowned them with glory and honor,

⁸subjecting all things under their feet."

Now in subjecting all things to them, God left nothing outside their control. As it is, we do not yet see everything in subjection to them, but we do see Jesus, who for a little while was made lower than the angels, now crowned with glory and honor because of the suffering of death, so that by the grace of God he might taste death for everyone.

¹⁰It was fitting that God, for whom and through whom all things exist, in bringing many children to glory, should make the pioneer of their salvation perfect through sufferings. ¹¹For the one who sanctifies and those who are sanctified all have one Father. For this reason Jesus is not ashamed to call them kindred, ¹²saying,

"I will proclaim your name to my kindred, in the midst of the congregation I will praise you."

¹⁰Then in the house the disciples asked him again about this matter. ¹¹He said to them, "Whoever divorces his wife and marries another commits adultery against her; ¹²and if she divorces her husband and marries another, she commits adultery."

¹³People were bringing little children to him in order that he might touch them; and the disciples spoke sternly to them. ¹⁴But when Jesus saw this, he was indignant and said to them, "Let the little children come to me; do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of God belongs. ¹⁵Truly I tell you, whoever does not receive the kingdom of God as a little child will never enter it." ¹⁶And he took them up in his arms, laid his hands on them, and blessed them.



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Apostles' Creed

On the third day he rose again;

he ascended into heaven, he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come to judge the living and the dead.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

*Or, "he descended into hell," another translation of this text in widespread use.

St. Andrew Lutheran Church Announcements October 6th, 2024

- Welcome to Worship at St. Andrew on the Twentieth Sunday after Pentecost, October 6th, 2024 We are so glad you are here, and we offer a special welcome to all visitors and guests connecting for the first time! Worship attendees are invited to make a name tag at the back of the worship space. Little Church Big Faith, a Bible lesson and activity for children, will take place after the prayer of the day. There are also worship "toolkits" to help children engage with worship and "busy bags" for younger children available in the bookcase at the back of the sanctuary. All are invited to gather for coffee other drinks and food, and conversation in the social hall after worship.
- Monthly Reparations Offering Today during Worship Jesus' parable from Luke's Gospel about a compassionate Samaritan provides an example of how God's people are called to work for healing and repair for our neighbors, independent of who or what caused harm. In light of this, St. Andrew has made a commitment to reparations in regard to African American spiritual songs used in our worship. The text and music of most hymns is attributed to specific authors, with copyrights in place, usage reported, and

royalties paid to those whose works are featured in worship. With African American spirituals, this is not possible. In response to many years of such uncredited use, St. Andrew invites the congregation to give a reparations offering. Funds received in worship will be donated to our siblings at Bethel AME Church, whose land and building were taken from them in the 1950s, to fund their development in the lower Hill District.

Worship on October 13th, 10:00 a.m. – St. Andrew was officially organized as a congregation on October 12, 1891, and we give thanks to God for so many years of goodness, grace, and ministry, in which the Gospel of Jesus has been proclaimed and people have come to know and experience God's love! Essential to the congregation's identity is our Reconciling in Christ designation, in which we publicly share our welcome and inclusion of LGBTQIA+ individuals and families, and of all God's people, in the life of the congregation, church, and society. In worship on Sunday, October 13th, we will celebrate St. Andrew's 133rd anniversary and renew our commitment to live our faith together as a Reconciling in Christ congregation!

In preparation for next Sunday, we invite you to consider a word or short phrase that expresses what you would like to celebrate about St. Andrew and the role it has played in your life of faith and/or in connecting you with God and others. During worship that day, we will invite everyone to write and share these offerings of thanksgiving on the poster boards along the way to Communion.

- Congregational Meeting after Worship Next Sunday, October 13th St. Andrew's leadership council has scheduled a congregational meeting after worship on Sunday, October 13th. The purpose will be to update the congregation on the plan to repair the roof and to discuss next steps toward a capital campaign, including a recommendation from the council for a resource assessment/feasibility study. As we give thanks for 133 years of God's blessings, we encourage you to be a part of this meeting as we look with hope toward the future of St. Andrew!
- Support Days for Girls Pittsburgh: Collecting Supplies in October! Earlier in the year, St. Andrew shared an opportunity from LAMPa to call for Pennsylvania to provide menstrual hygiene products in public spaces as a crucial step in addressing educational, gender, and economic inequity. As a local follow-up, St. Andrew has connected with Days for Girls Pittsburgh, which helps to provide education and access to feminine hygiene products for people in need. As an expression of our church's "God's Work, Our Hands" commitment, St. Andrew is collecting items to make Days for Girls' hygiene kits starting on October 6th. We are collecting women's underwear (new), sizes medium and large (5, 6, 7), 100% cotton (please avoid white); washcloths, 100% cotton (please avoid white); bar soap (hotel-size); containers of laundry detergent pods ("free and clear" of scents); and packing supplies such as 5/8-inch ribbon and packing tape. Items may be placed in the collection bin located in the social hall anytime until October 27th.

Lessons from Dietrich Bonhoeffer in a House Divided and a World on Fire – Wednesdays, October 9th, 16th, 23rd, and 30th – Come and explore the life and theology of Dietrich Bonhoeffer, and the lessons we can use as we live at the intersection of faith and civic life today. Bonhoeffer was a Lutheran pastor and theologian living in Nazi Germany, who eventually joined the resistance and was arrested and killed before the end of WWII. This curriculum was compiled by Dr. Lori Brandt Hale, an internationally

renowned Bonhoeffer scholar. Lutheran Advocacy Ministry in Pennsylvania (LAMPa) is bringing this curriculum to congregations to inspire deeper conversation and discernment about our discipleship. Pastor Erin Jones, staff at LAMPa and member of St. Andrew, leads these sessions.
