- Children are invited to attend Little Church Big Faith, a Bible lesson and activity, during worship (after the Prayer of the Day). The group returns to the worship space for the liturgy of Holy Communion.
- A nursery is available through the doors at the left side of the sanctuary and across from the doorway to the Social Hall. Look for a purple-colored room.
- Worship "toolkits" to help children engage with the service, along with "busy bags" for younger children, are available in the bookcase at the back of the sanctuary. Please feel free to take one to use with/for your children.
- Holy Communion is served with bread (gluten-free available) and wine or grape juice. The
 presiding minister will distribute the bread (host). Please consume this and then pick up an empty
 glass from the tray. The Communion Assistant will pour wine or grape juice into your glass.
 Please step to the side to consume the wine or grape juice. Feel free to kneel at the altar for prayer
 and reflection. As you return to your pew, glasses may be returned to the empty trays on either
 side of the center section.
- A restroom is available on the main level of the church, through the doors to the Social Hall and to the right in the main office.

First Reading – Acts 9: 36-43

³⁶ Now in Joppa there was a disciple whose name was Tabitha, which in Greek is Dorcas. She was devoted to good works and acts of charity. ³⁷ At that time she became ill and died. When they had washed her, they laid her in a room upstairs. ³⁸ Since Lydda was near Joppa, the disciples, who heard that Peter was there, sent two men to him with the request, "Please come to us without delay." ³⁹ So Peter got up and went with them, and when he arrived, they took him to the room upstairs. All the widows stood beside him, weeping and showing tunics and other clothing that Dorcas had made while she was with them. ⁴⁰ Peter put all of them outside, and then he knelt down and prayed. He turned to the body and said, "Tabitha, get up." Then she opened her eyes, and seeing Peter, she sat up. ⁴¹ He gave her his hand and helped her up. Then calling the saints and widows, he showed her to be alive. ⁴² This became known throughout Joppa, and many believed in the Lord. ⁴³ Meanwhile, he stayed in Joppa for some time with a certain Simon, a tanner.

"Salvation belongs to our God who is seated on the throne and to the Lamb!"

¹¹ And all the angels stood around the throne and around the elders and the four living creatures, and they fell on their faces before the throne and worshiped God, ¹² singing,

"Amen! Blessing and glory and wisdom and thanksgiving and honor and power and might be to our God forever and ever! Amen."



Nicene Creed

C: We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ,

the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the virgin Mary and became truly human. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son,* who with the Father and the Son is worshiped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

- Southwestern Pennsylvania Synod Assembly and Process for Election of New Bishop Begin Next Saturday, May 17th! Bishop Kurt Kusserow of our local Southwestern Pennsylvania Synod is concluding his third term in office and will not be seeking reelection. This means that this synod will be electing a new bishop for only third time since the founding of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America 1988. We invite your prayers for the Church, the ELCA, and the Southwestern Pennsylvania Synod as we discern who will be called as our new bishop. Initial nominations of candidates for bishop will be made on a first ballot on May 17th, and nominees will have one week to remove their names from consideration. The remaining candidates will be on the ballot when synod assembly continues on June 12-14th. St. Andrew will be represented at synod assembly by voting members Kelly Spanninger, Cynthia Holden, and Pastor Ross along with visiting member Colleen Cooke we invite your prayers for them, also!
- Noisy Offering Next Sunday, May 18th, during Worship On the third Sunday of each month, St. Andrew's children lead the congregation in a Noisy Offering, in which people are invited to throw their change into buckets that the children carry around the church and bring forward as an additional offering. Each month's Noisy Offering supports a local, national, or international church-related or otherwise charitable organization. - in Christ (LGBTQIA+ affirming) ministries; supports ministries of our friends at Bethel AME Church; and works with local organizations supporting immigrants and refugees. - Represent St. Andrew at Pittsburgh Pride Saturday, May 31st, in Two Hour Blocks from 10:00 a.m. – 2:00 p.m. – St. Andrew is a Reconciling in Christ (RIC) congregation, publicly supporting the full welcome, participation, and affirmation of LGBTQIA+ siblings in church and society. As a part of this ministry, we participate in Pittsburgh Pride each year with other RIC congregations in the area. This year's booth will be at the Pride festival on the North Side on Saturday, May 31st.
