It is possible to understand Jesus' high priestly prayer, a prayer he offered shortly before his death, as the petitions of the ascended Christ for his own throughout history—to our day—and beyond. Jesus prays for us. In Holy Baptism we become believers in God, have our robes washed in the flood of Christ's forgiveness, and receive the gift of life forever with all the saints.

- Worship Services are live-streamed to multiple online platforms. By attending worship, you agree that your image and voice may be broadcast.

- A nursery is available through the doors at the left side of the sanctuary and across from the doorway to the Social Hall. Look for a purple-colored room.
- Worship "toolkits" to help children engage with the service, along with "busy bags" for younger children, are available in the bookcase at the back of the sanctuary. Please feel free to take one to use with/for your children.
- Holy Communion is served with bread (gluten-free available) and wine or grape juice. The

 and reflection. As you return to your pew, glasses may be returned to the empty trays on either
 side of the center section.



Word

God speaks to us in Scripture reading, preaching, and song

First Reading – Acts 16: 16-34

¹⁶ One day as we were going to the place of prayer, we met an enslaved woman who had a spirit of divination and brought her owners a great deal of money by fortune-telling. ¹⁷ While she followed Paul and us, she would cry out, "These men are slaves of the Most High God, who proclaim to you the way of salvation." ¹⁸ She kept doing this for many days. But Paul, very much annoyed, turned and said to the spirit, "I order you in the name of Jesus Christ to come out of her." And it came out that very hour.

¹⁹ But when her owners saw that their hope of making money was gone, they seized Paul and Silas and dragged them into the marketplace before the authorities. ²⁰ When they had brought them before the magistrates, they said, "These men, these Jews, are disturbing our city ²¹ and are advocating customs that are not lawful for us, being Romans, to adopt or observe." ²² The crowd joined in attacking them, and the magistrates had them stripped of their clothing and ordered them to be beaten with rods. ²³ After they had given them a severe flogging, they threw them into prison and ordered the jailer to keep them securely. ²⁴ Following these instructions, he put them in the innermost cell and fastened their feet in the stocks.

²⁵ About midnight Paul and Silas were praying and singing hymns to God, and the prisoners were listening to them. ²⁶ Suddenly there was an earthquake so violent that the foundations of the prison were shaken, and immediately all the doors were opened and everyone's chains were unfastened. ²⁷ When the jailer woke up and saw the prison doors wide open, he drew his sword and was about to kill himself, since he supposed that the prisoners had escaped. ²⁸ But Paul shouted in a loud voice, "Do not harm yourself, for we are all here." ²⁹ The jailer called for lights, and rushing in, he fell down trembling before Paul and Silas. ³⁰ Then he brought them outside and said, "Sirs, what must I do to be saved?" ³¹ They answered, "Believe in the Lord Jesus, and you will be saved, you and your household." ³² They spoke the word of the Lord to him and to all who were in his house. ³³ At the same hour of the night he took them and washed their wounds; then he and his entire family were baptized without delay. *continued*

³⁴ He brought them up into the house and set food before them, and he and his entire household rejoiced that he had become a believer in God.


Holy Communion





Please feel free to take one to use with/for your children. A nursery is available through the door to the left of the worship space and across the social hall (look for a purple room). Everyone is invited to gather in social hall for coffee, other drinks, food, and conversation after worship! We pray that everyone has a blessed Easter season!

- Little Church Big Faith Pausing for Summer Little Church Big Faith, St. Andrew's Bible lesson and activity for children that takes place during worship, is now taking a break for the summer Please watch future communications for information on when we will resume in September!
- Monthly Reparations Offering Today during Worship In Luke's Gospel, Jesus tells a story about a compassionate Samaritan, suggesting that God's people are called to work for healing and restoration for our neighbors, regardless of who or what caused them harm. In light of this, St. Andrew has made a commitment to reparations in regard to African American spiritual songs used in our worship. The text and music of most hymns is attributed to specific authors, with copyrights in place, usage reported, and royalties paid to those whose works are featured in worship. With African American spirituals, this is not possible. In response to many years of such uncredited use, St. Andrew invites the congregation to give a reparations offering. Funds received in worship will be donated to our siblings at Bethel AME Church, whose land and building were taken from them in the 1950s, to fund their development in the Hill District.
- Welcoming Congregations and Sanctuary Discussion Today after Worship What Does This Mean? Several years ago, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), of which St. Andrew is a member, started a new initiative called AMMPARO, based on the Spanish word for "refuge" or "protection." AMMPARO is an acronym for Accompanying Migrant Minors with Protection, Advocacy, Representation, and Opportunities. The initiative was a response to the great needs of unaccompanied minors who were coming to the U.S., and ELCA churches were invited to support the work. St. Andrew became an AMMPARO Welcoming Congregation, committing to accompany and minister to migrants, to pray for migrants, and to advocate for just public policy regarding immigration. In 2019, at the ELCA Churchwide Assembly, our church identified itself as a "Sanctuary Denomination," which prompted much discussion of how we interpret the word "sanctuary." We invite you to stay after worship today for a discussion of our AMMPARO Welcoming Congregation designation and what this and "Sanctuary" means to us at St. Andrew in 2025.
- June Produce Distribution Tuesday, June 3rd, 5:30-7:00 p.m. St. Andrew partners with Greater Pittsburgh Community Food Bank to serve as a distribution site for fresh produce on the first Tuesday of every month. This month's distribution will be on Tuesday, June 3rd. We invite people of the congregation to help with the distribution from 5:30-7:00 p.m. and/or to help with unloading and setup during the day between 10:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m.
- Celebrate Confirmation Next Sunday, June 8th! Two youth of St. Andrew, Kai and Adam, will be making their Confirmation through Affirmation of Baptism next Sunday, June 8th. They have participated in two years of weekly learning and faith formation, along with a summer session of Confirmation camp. We invite your prayers for Kai and Adam as they prepare to commit themselves more deeply to living their faith and the promises of Baptism!
- Southwestern Pennsylvania Synod Assembly Continues Thursday, June 12th Saturday, June 14th Our Southwestern Pennsylvania Synod is in the process of electing a new bishop for only third time since the founding of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America in 1988. We invite your prayers for the Church, the ELCA, the Southwestern Pennsylvania Synod, and the candidates as we discern who will be called

- as our new bishop. Initial nominations of candidates for bishop were made on May 17th, and those discerning a call to the office of bishop will be on the ecclesiastical ballot when synod assembly continues on June 12-14th. St. Andrew will be represented at synod assembly by voting members Kelly Spanninger, Cynthia Holden, along with visiting member Colleen Cooke and the many pastors in the congregation we invite your prayers for them, also!
