In recent years, celebrations of the Twelve Days of Christmas have often included a Service of Lessons and Carols, an opportunity to explore the breadth of biblical texts about the incarnation of Jesus and to sing additional, much-beloved hymns of the season. St. Andrew will feature Lessons and Carols in the first part of worship today, then continue with the meal of Holy Communion. In our gathering around word and meal, God continues to redeem us, lift us up, and carry us forward as God's people as in days of old.

- A nursery is available through the doors at the left side of the sanctuary and across from the doorway to the Social Hall. Look for a purple-colored room.
- Worship “toolkits” to help children engage with the service, along with “busy bags” for younger children, are available in the bookcase at the back of the sanctuary. Please feel free to take one to use with/for your children.
- Holy Communion is served with bread (gluten-free available) and wine or grape juice. The presiding minister will distribute the bread (host). Please consume this and then pick up an empty glass from the tray. The Communion Assistant will pour wine or grape juice into your glass. Please step to the side to consume the wine or grape juice. Feel free to kneel at the altar for prayer and reflection. As you return to your pew, glasses may be returned to the empty trays on the side of the center section.
- A restroom is available on the main level of the church, through the doors to the Social Hall and to the right in the main office.

- **Welcome to Worship at St. Andrew on the First Sunday of Christmas** – We are thankful you are here, and we offer a special welcome to all visitors and guests who are here for the first time! A nursery is available through the door to the left of the worship space and across the social hall (look for a purple room). There are also worship “toolkits” to help children engage with worship and “busy bags” for younger children available in the bookcase at the back of the sanctuary. Please feel free to take one to use with/for your children.
- **Monthly Reparations Offering Next Week, Sunday, January 4th, during Worship** – In Luke’s Gospel, Jesus tells a story about a compassionate Samaritan, suggesting that God’s people are called to work for healing and restoration for our neighbors, regardless of who or what caused them harm. In light of this, St. Andrew has made a commitment to reparations in regard to African American spiritual songs used in our worship. The text and music of most hymns is attributed to specific authors, with copyrights in place, usage reported, and royalties paid to those whose works are featured in worship. With African American spirituals, this is not possible. In response to many years of such uncredited use, St. Andrew invites the congregation to give a

reparations offering. Funds received in worship will be donated to our siblings at Bethel AME Church, whose land and building were taken from them in the 1950s, to fund their development in the Hill District.

- **Help Take Down Christmas Decorations Sunday, January 4th** – Thank you to everyone who helped decorate the church for the Christmas season this past Sunday, December 21st. Though it is not as fun as decorating for Christmas, we also need help taking down and putting away all the decorations from the season. It is especially helpful to have people who can carry items downstairs to the basement. The Christmas season concludes with the Epiphany of our Lord on January 6th, so we will take down the Christmas decorations on Sunday, January 4th. Thank you!
- **Volunteers needed with WPA BOLD Holiday Party, Sunday, January 18th, after Worship** – For several years, the Western PA Blind Outdoor Leisure Development Organization (BOLD), has been holding their holiday parties at St. Andrew, and they will do so again on Sunday, January 18th, from 1:00 pm - 5:30 pm. The group has expressed that it would be helpful to have volunteers from the congregation there that day to help set up (this can be done after coffee hour), greet members and help them to find seats, assist with serving buffet food, leading and helping people to get food, and cleanup. If you are willing to help, please speak with Pastor Ross. Thank you very much.
